#### **"WHAT YOU DO MATTERS"**

I found that statement on the cover of a Holocaust Memorial Museum brochure as I was cleaning off my desk. It's a powerful little booklet that tells the stories of a few people, some you've heard of, some you haven't, who chose to do something about the evil they saw hap-

pening under the Nazis. They chose to make a difference, even risking their very lives.

There were those who sang louder so they wouldn't hear the trains headed to the death camps past their churches. There were those who tried to avoid and ignore what was really happening. And then there were those who participated in the evil – out of self-preservation, indifference, or ignorance. Those not being rounded up, and those not doing the rounding up, were on the sidelines and they had a decision to make: do I try to help stop the injustice or do I ignore it as best I can? Do I value human life? More than my comfort? More than my reputation? More than my circle of loved ones? What you do matters.

All of us are on those sidelines again today. Abortion is being enshrined into law so that a baby can be eliminated at any time during a nine-month pregnancy and even after birth. Many states, Minnesota included, are choosing to be destination abortion sites to attract business from other more life-affirming states. Abortion is celebrated like a victory and we say "I'm not for abortion, but I voted for the pro-abortion candidate" for any number of reasons that are not nearly as real and valuable as just one of those babies who will now die under that politician's watch. What you do matters.

Maybe you are slowed from action because you carry your own burdens from past decisions you regret. There is ALWAYS hope! Take it to confession and get cleaned up so you are equipped to be effective. You have lots to offer, God can't wait to forgive a truly repentant soul, and...what you do matters.

Now Canada is offering medical assistance with suicide to anyone who is in pain, depressed, waiting for medical treatment, young, old, and in between. "It is on offer, and we can do it today." No delay to think about it or let things improve. Do you really think it will be that long before it happens here? Are you watching what the politicians are proposing and enacting? What you do matters.

Whatever happened to "REDEMPTIVE SUFFERING"? Ever hear of it? You bring your suffering – whatever it is – and offer it to Jesus on behalf of yourself, others, sinners, a cause, the holy souls in Purgatory, etc. Let Jesus take what you offer onto the cross with His own Suffering and bless it and make it USEFUL! Today we don't want to suffer. We run as fast and far as we can to avoid it. But coming through hard times and suffering is a powerful way to grow strong just like a forge strengthens steel. But the only way to gain that strength and insight is by going through it, with Jesus. What you do matters.

Human Trafficking is a pervasive problem all over the world and even right here in the US and in Minnesota. People are bought and sold, kidnapped, enslaved, sex trafficked, disappeared, used up and thrown away. And most of us go right on living our lives blissfully unaware. What if you increased your awareness, found organizations who are freeing slaves and pursuing human trafficking rings? What you do matters.

Do you know which businesses support the same values you espouse? After you pay for a service, to which cause does that company donate? If, for example, I continue to shop CVS or Walgreens after they begin selling the abortion pill, am I collaborating with the enemy? What you do matters.

We are so conditioned, as of late, to make decisions based on fear and safety. Conditions in recent years have impacted us that way. Social unrest, covid, strong opinions whether you want to hear them or not, lockdown, truth and lies, the list goes on. But what does the Lord tell us? "Be strong and courageous." (Deuteronomy 31.6); "Pick up your cross and follow Me." (Matt. 16.24);

"My yoke is easy and my burden is light." (Matt. 11.30). Does that sound like run and hide in fear or do nothing because of fear? Jesus says further: "You are the salt of the earth, but if salt loses its taste, with what can it be seasoned? It is no longer good for anything but to be thrown out and trampled underfoot. You are the light of the world. A city set on a mountain cannot be hidden. Just so, your light must shine before others, that they may see your good deeds and glorify your Heavenly Father." (Matt. 5.13-16). What you do matters.

Mental health issues and drug addiction affect large swaths of our population and it is easy to drive right by and choose not see the devastation. Each person we bypass is an original, lovingly created individual whom we have a chance to reach out to, either directly or through the service of organizations. What you do matters.

"For God has not given us a spirit of fear and timidity, but of power, love, and self-discipline." (II Timothy 1.7) So are you ready to meet the challenge and DO something? Check out any of the following: Caregivers Group or any other parish outreach group, Pre-Born, Created Equal, 2ndVote, Operation Underground Railroad, Christian Solidarity International and so many more amazing organizations doing something good regarding the sanctity of life! Pray. Let God move your heart. Get involved. "Be of good courage, and let us be courageous for our people, and for the cities of our God, and may the Lord do what seems good to him." (II Samuel. 10.12) because...what you do matters.



# Around the Archdiocese



Pope Francis this morning named Father Michael John Izen, a priest of the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis, as an auxiliary bishop of the Archdiocese of Saint Paul and Minneapolis, assigning him the titular see of Newport.

Bishop-elect Izen is currently the pastor of the Churches of Saint Michael and Saint Mary in Stillwater, the parochial administrator of the Church of St. Charles in Bayport and the canonical administrator of Saint Croix Catholic school.

#### Our Fascinating Faith Ordinary Time

Between the end of the Christmas season and the start of Lent, the liturgical year begins a period known as Ordinary Time. That season is interrupted by the seasons of Lent and Easter, and then resumes again after Pentecost. The English translation of the Latin name for this season has received much criticism because of our association of the word "ordinary" with something of lesser value, the opposite of something special. Critics point out that Sunday is the original feast day of the Church, that there is nothing at all "ordinary" about our weekly celebration of the Lord's dying and rising. Translators explain that in this context the English word "ordinary" retains the root meaning of "ordinal," something counted "in order," and that the Sundays throughout the year are in fact named by their numerical order.

It is helpful to understand how all five of the "special" seasons of the liturgical year (Advent, Christmas, Ordinary Time, Lent, Easter) fit together to unfold the single mystery of Christ. As we continue the year now with Ordinary Time, we are mindful that what we celebrate is indeed as "extraordinary" an experience of God's grace as one could ever imagine.
